

"Remembering The Main Thing" by Glen Rhodes, Ministry Team Leader, Minister of Discipling

During the month of January we remembered, celebrated, and reflected on the 500th anniversary of Anabaptism. Many other Anabaptists around the world joined us in this recognition, and many communities had special meetings and events to further understand the history and impact that Anabaptism has had on our faith and in our world. While these remembrances and

celebrations are important they must not become an idol or cause us to become prideful. Our history is filled with moments of great faith, great division, and great growth, but we must always remember why this Anabaptist movement in the 1500's began in the first place.

Following the life, death, resurrection, and ascension of

Jesus around 33 A.D. the church of Jesus Christ continued to grow and experienced the Holy Spirit in their midst during that time. Persecution was prevalent but the church continued to grow. Many of the first 12 disciples were martyred for their faith. After several centuries had passed the Emperor Constantine had a spiritual experience in 313 A.D. and allowed Christianity to become the recognized religion of the Roman Empire. This stopped the persecution, but it also changed Christianity and the church for many years during the Middle Ages. Infants were now being baptized, large impersonal cathedrals were built, and faith in Jesus became more about creeds that one recited instead of how they lived their life.

Some 1500 years later a Catholic Priest named Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany and the Protestant Reformation began. Out of this reformation came a group of radical students, former priests, and peasants who began

> baptizing adults upon their professed belief in Jesus as their Lord and Savior. These were the first Anabaptists. In the years since there have been many schisms and other new groups that have formed out of those first Anabaptist groups. Mennonites, Brethren, Amish, Hutterites, and many other denominations that practice

adult believers' baptism trace their roots back to those first Anabaptists. During the messages in January we looked at some of the core principles of Anabaptism which were...Jesus is the center of our faith, community is the center of our lives, reconciliation is the center of our work, and most importantly, Jesus Christ is our Savior and our Lord. It is important to celebrate our ancestry and heritage, but it is imperative that we celebrate our faith in Jesus Christ and live in the way that he taught us to live. In essence, this was the reason Anabaptism began in the first place. May we always keep the main thing the main thing.


